







For the Downers Grove South Marching Mustang Band, practice is year round with five summer days at a band camp. They play all the home games and go to five competitions. This year, over the school Christmas Break, Dec. 29 to Jan. 3, they

will march and compete in the 1991 National Hall of Fame Bowl Festival.


and then wedge. It's good alone, with fruit, and with crackers."

1 egg white

2 t. cumin (opt.)

The Marching Mustangs of Downers Grove South High School received a second place and third place award in Class AA at the Falcon Marching Band Tournament in Wheaton.





Band's travel plans up in the air

The Downers Grove South High School Marching Mustangs Band was scheduled to join 28 other marching bands at the Music Bowl Festival in Tampa, Fla., from Dec. 29 to Jan. 3—a trip that would culminate in a mass band halftime hoopla at the Hall of Fame Bowl.

Now the Marching Mustangs may be inducted into the hall of fame as the most disappointed marching band in history.

In January this year, the band was supposed to travel to Germany but was forced to cancel the trip because of the conflict in the Middle East.

Now, another conflict — the shutdown of Midway Airlines — has once again left the Mustangs' plans up in the air. The band had secured 110 tickets on the airline for the trip at a cost of \$27,440 — money it had raised through Market Day proceeds.

"For a lot of the kids this is a double disappointment," said the band's director Al Roselieb. "We knew Midway was having problems,

but we got daily assurances that it was not going to be a problem. Now, everyone feels sorry for us, but, the truth of the matter is there is nothing anyone can do at this point."

"It's disappointing to see our two years of hard work going down the drain," said 16-year-old Allison

Walis, who plays snare drum in the band.

While the city and the airlines duke it out in court, the band can do nothing but watch. Well, not really.

Roselieb said he has heard from United, Northwest, Delta and American Airlines and while exploring various avenues. He even made tentative arrangements to charter buses for the trip.

Steve Pocock, a former Midway pilot from Downers Grove, is trying to secure a plane, fuel, a flight crew and a maintenance crew to take the band to Florida himself.

"It's a longshot," Pocock admitted. "But this is something the kids shouldn't get cheated out of. I have teen-age kids and I know what it's like to raise funds.

"That's what I really like about the Midwest and Downers Grove — people really try to help each other."

Pocock, who has been a captain for

Midway for the past five years, said his plan depends on insurance and on how long the airline can keep its operating certificate. A plane should not be a problem, he said, if the other matters are cleared up. Midway has 30 unused airplanes to pick from, 17 of which were bought from Eastern Airlines when it closed.

The school also called on state Rep. Thomas McCracken (81st-District) for help. A spokesman there said they are "doing everything in their power

to help."

According to Roselieb, the marching band travels to different areas in the country every year. Past trips have included visits to the Festival of States in St. Petersburg, Fla., the Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington D.C., the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York, the Kentucky Derby Festival in Louisville, Ky., and the Aloha Bowl in Honolulu Hawaii.

The Downers Grove South High School Band was quite proud of its plans to perform at the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa, Fla. on New Years Day.

But the students are devastated and wondering how they will get there because the shutdown of Midway Airlines Wed. Nov. 13 has left them holding about \$27,000 worth of tickets and no one to honor them. Thousands of other area travelers are experiencing the same dilemma with their Midway tickets.

"A lot of students are very mad, depressed and down right now because they were part of the band trip to Germany that was cancelled earlier this year due to the Gulf War Crisis," said Al Roselieb, director of bands at Downers Grove South.

"Now we don't know anything definite about how we will get to the game," Roselieb added.

Earlier this year the band purchased 110 seats on two Midway Airline Flights for Dec. 29. Roselieb said the band planned to compete at the Fame Bowl for awards in field show, parade, colorguard and percussion against 28 other high school bands from around the country.

Afterwards, all the bands were to play together for the audience during half-time.

The trip was to end with the students riding the bus to Orlando to spend a day at Disneyworld's MGM Studios. They would take the bus back to Tampa and fly home on Midway Airlines.

The band students planned fundraisers beginning in November 1990 to raise money for the trip.

However, the students' plans stalled when Northwest Airlines announced it would not honor its deal to purchase Midway's assets. As a result, Midway ceased operations.

Area travel agents tried to work non-stop to protect those passengers traveling on Midway tickets or those clients who had already purchased them, according to Rosalyn Murr, owner of Action Travel in Downers Grove.

However, the agents could only issue refunds to clients who had booked their flights on credit cards. Murr said clients who paid cash, like the Downers South Band, were left unprotected.

"Right now our money is tied up until the bankruptcy court decides the suit between Northwest and Midway Airlines," Roselieb said. "If an airline did recognize our situation, they must wait until the settlement to receive their money. That could take years of litigation."

School officials tried contacting other major airlines, such as United, American, Delta and Northwest Airlines, in hopes of finding someone "who will recognize this is a good opportunity for public relations and honor our tickets."

However, Roselieb said he has yet to find an airline which can provide them the space they need during the highly traveled holiday season.

"We take up quite a bit of space for our equipment, uniforms and band members," Roselieb said.

Murr added that many travel agents are working frantically to re-issue tickets and accommodate travelers "as a chance to create a lot of good will with their clients."

"The travel agencies really haven't lost anything from the situation," Murr said. "What can happen in the long-term is an increase in competition among airlines and people paying for their tickets with credit cards instead of cash."

Roselieb said the only other alternative is for the band students to ride a bus to Florida. However, he said this would mean the students would need to raise another \$27,000 for the trip.

"That would be difficult to do," Roselieb said. "If we choose not go, we will also lose the money we already paid for the hotels there."

Roselieb and the other school officials still remain hopeful their tickets will get honored. Currently, State Sen. Thomas McCracken (R-81, Downers Grove) and Alan Dixon are trying to make contacts and help find a solution to the band's dilemma.

Roselieb said the students have been dedicated to practicing during the week and on weekends since the summer in preparation for their performance.

School band has tickets, can't travel

When Midway Airlines was grounded by its financial woes, so, too, were the high-flying plans of the Downers Grove South High School to march in the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa on New Year's Day.

The band, with 92 members and 18 school staff members and adult chaperons, paid \$27,720 for airline tickets on Oct. 30 to fly Midway to Florida. Now the band is waiting in the wings for an airline rescuer.

Quality Travel, a Bowling Green, Ky., travel agency specializing in arranging high school band trips, has the band's Midway tickets and has been unable to persuade another airline to honor them.

What's worse, this is the second time this year that the band's travel plans have hit a snag. The band was supposed to go to Germany and Austria in April to play and tour, but that was canceled by the school board because of air travel concerns prompted by the Persian Gulf war.

"We're a creditor standing in line with many others," Craig Zeck, Downers Grove South principal, said of the latest fiasco. "No airline has come forward to help."

After Midway's announcement last week that it was going out of business, Downers Grove South band members were stunned.

"I wondered what was happening with our money and whether we will need to raise more money for the trip," said

Stacey Vein, a percussion player.

Jamie Podojil, a snare drum player, said he was more optimistic—for a while.

"I thought some airline would come right away to help us," he said. "I am mad at the airlines. We have been practicing a long time, and we want to go down there and prove ourselves."

For 14 months, band members have been working to raise funds by selling candy and tulip bulbs and through "Market Day," a program in which relatives,

friends and neighbors order food that is delivered to the school and distributed.

The trip, scheduled for Dec. 29 through Jan. 3, will cost \$78,000, including the air fare, hotel and other travel arrangements.

The Downers Grove South band was to be among 25 high school groups giving a combined halftime presentation at the Hall of Fame Bowl. It also was to be in other shows and in competitions with other high schools. Plus, there was to be a visit to Disney World after the football game.

"I feel cheated, and I also feel we got caught up in a problem in the airline industry we had no control over," said Alan Roselieb, band director. "The airline industry owes us."

Roselieb and band members believe an airline has much to gain in public relations value in coming to the band's rescue by honoring its tickets.

A similar rescue took place in

March when United Airlines saved a trip for the Palatine High School choir and symphonic band. That band was set to go to a musical festival in Hawaii when the money for tickets was found missing from its bank account. A former booster club treasurer was later indicted on embezzlement charges.

United provided nearly \$90,000

worth of tickets.

But Roselieb conceded there are big problems to overcome if the Downers Grove South trip is to

occur as planned.

"One is the time of year we are traveling," he said. "It is the busiest travel time, and airlines' equipment and personnel are stretched thin.

"The second problem is another airline is not going to get this money from Midway for a long

time because it will be tied up in court battles. When Midway ceased operations, it announced other airlines would honor its tickets. However, when we asked about it, we were told it was on a standby basis.

"When we are flying 110 people with instruments, uniforms and equipment, we cannot fly on a standby basis. We need guaranteed seats."

Roselieb said the band had a difficult time in even making the initial arrangements, but Midway scheduled it to use two flights, one for 40 people and the second for 70.

Despite these formidable obstacles, band members remain optimistic they will be in Florida on New Year's Day.

"We have been working so hard," said Karen Hudzik, a saxophone player. "I am hoping some airline will honor our tickets so we can make this trip."

Downers South band is airborne again

When Jack Calo's phone rang at 6:30 Thursday morning, he thought

he was dreaming.

The voice at the other end of the line sounded like Downers Grove South High School marching band director Al Roselieb. He was in a good mood. It sounded like he said everything had been cleared up with the band's trip to the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa, Fla., which had almost been cancelled due to Midway Airlines' recent shutdown.

"I thought it was a dream," said the band's senior bass drummer. "He was so happy and lately, everyone's been stressed out around here."

What Calo heard was not a dream. It was more like a dream come true.

United Airlines has offered to fly the band down to Tampa at no extra charge. And when the bill is somewhere around \$27,000, it's no wonder Calo thought he was dreaming.

"I knew someone would come through, it was just a matter of time," said junior drum major Deb

Fialek.

United did come through, but the news came so late on Wednesday that Roselieb had to wait until the wee hours Thursday morning to get the news out to his band members. Downers Grove South Principal Craig Zeck then made the announcement to the entire student body at 9 a.m. Thursday.

"The feeling with (United president and Chief Executive Officer)

Stephen Wolf was that we're a hometown airline and we were in a unique position to step in and help these people," said United spokesman Joe Hopkins.

"I think it gives the kids a deep appreciation that the system works," said Roselieb. "If you just stay with it, something will work out. We're

pretty delighted."

It's no wonder Roselieb is delighted. His band's planned trip to Germany in January had to be cancelled because of the Persian Gulf war.

Roselieb extended a big thanks to go to state Rep. Thomas McCracken (R-81st District), who was instrumental in talking to United.

"United was the only choice."

McCracken said, "They're headquartered here and it was something that needed to be decided at the highest level. It was a very magnanimous gesture."

The band's plans will be slightly rearranged through United. Thirty of the band's 92 members will take a flight to Orlando and hop on a bus to meet the others in Tampa on Dec. 29. There they will join 28 other bands in the Music Bowl Festival, which consists of a series of competitions.

On Jan. 1, all of the bands will play in a halftime bonanza at the Hall of

Fame Bowl.

The Downers South band will then travel back to Orlando for a day at Disney World. A fitting end to the saga.

DG South band prepares for flight

The Downers Grove South High School Marching Mustang Band is ecstatic that United Airlines has agreed to honor their Midway Airline tickets and fly them to Tampa, Fla., so they can perform at the Hall of Fame Bowl on New Years Day.

United officials confirmed the offer with school officials in the early morning Thursday, Nov. 21, after various residents, particularly state Rep. Thomas McCracken (R-81st, Downers Grove) phoned the airline and mentioned the students were grounded with \$27,000 worth of Midway tickets and no one to honor them.

"I cut through the red tape and strongly requested the students' dilemma be considered in the highest quarters," McCracken said.

"I did everything I could to help when the school officials requested my help when it first happened," McCracken added. "I empathized with the students who have worked hard, and I did not want them to miss out on this opportunity."

The Marching Mustangs, their chaperones and equipment are booked on two United flights leaving Sunday, Dec. 29, for Tampa, Fla. They are scheduled

to return Friday, Jan. 3, at no extra cost.

Stephen M. Wolfe, chairmanpresident-CEO of the airline, made the final decision to accommodate the students once he heard of their situation, a United spokesman said.

"We are donating the tickets and do not know when or whether we will be reimbursed," the spokesman said. "We are not looking for anything. We realize the students have worked hard and want to help them."

The airline is not worried this will set a precedent with other stranded Midway travelers because they consider the students' dilemma "a very unique situation," the spokesman said.

"We are trying to assist all travelers stranded the best we can," she added. "Our phones have been ringing off the hook nonstop. But in the students' case, it is a great honor to play at the Hall of Fame Bowl and in itself is a very unique situation."

Al Roselieb, Downers South band director, said the students cheered when Principal Craig Zeck made the announcement over the school's public address system Thursday morning, Nov. 21.

Roselieb said he was grateful to McCracken for helping his students. He added McCracken

helped the band five years ago by securing a state of Illinois grant which partly funded the students trip to perform at the Aloha Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii.


"His help this time was a



It had gotten to be a little like a soap opera: good news, followed by tragedy.

But on Sunday afternoon, after 14 months of waiting, hordes of Downers Grove South High School band members and staff stood in Midway Airport, clad in warm-weather attire and bopping to portable radios as they waited to board United Airlines Flight 1804 to Florida.

Many were looking forward to New Year's Day, when they would play at halftime during the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa. Others, like 17-year-old Amy Veith, were looking forward to a little fun in the sun.

"It's awesome," exclaimed the senior. "I'm looking forward to going to Disney World and getting a tan.

The band is to be among 25 high school groups giving a combined presentation at the bowl game. It also is scheduled to be in other shows and competitions. Plus, the trip to Disney World.

Yet the dreams of Amy and the rest who made the trip had almost demateriwized in front of their eyes.

"We really are just grateful," he said as he corralled students and staff at the airport. "Words can't describe how much we appreciate it. There were a lot of kids who got quite panicky."



Band members had a difficult time maintaining morale because their first international tour to Germany was cancelled in early February 1991.





Music transcends language barriers

"When they are standing in the hallway you can't tell who is

The experience teaches students about the United States and what differences and similarities there are between the two countries, he said.

"It's a different country with different habits," Schaefer

said.

The Music School is funded by the state. It focuses on playing, preparing students to play in professional orchestras and bands, he said.

"I've got a student who started playing Brahms at age 6." Schaefer said.


He has another 20-year-old student who just enrolled.

Germans bring music to area

In Germany, there is such a love of music that over 90 percent of the population knows how to play some type of musical instrument, even if it is just for fun.

"We mainly have department stores in our cities," Bauer said in clear, understandable English, because all German students are required to learn it as part of their curriculum.

The German students were allowed to experience the American school system by attending classes at Downers North and South high schools Monday, April 14. During the day, they also played a rehearsal with the Downers South band.

The highlight of their visit was a special concert performance at Downers South Sunday, April 13. Almost 500 area residents attended and wished the students well on their visit.

But whether the German students will be allowed to play a farewell concert Wednesday, April 15, at the Daley Civic Center was still undetermined at press time Tuesday afternoon due to the downtown flooding problem.
